

where he was still close to many of his school friends. He graduated from Tulsa University where he met his Lifelong Brother, Travis Bradshaw.

John described himself as A Big Nerd. He loved Sci-fi, especially Star Wars and Star Trek. Dr. Who was a favorite of his too.

Mainly, John loved people. He made friends wherever he went all over the world. He was forgiving and only wanted to make people happy. John was smart and successful, but mostly he was kind. He was a truly good person.

John is survived by his wife, Melinda Mallet. John loved his family and friends unconditionally. He was preceded in death by his parents, Euby and Pearl. He has a Mama Billie who was his neighbor from age five, she continued to be a very important part of his life. His Uncle Wayne Decker and Aunt Roberta Decker were like parents to him, and he cherished and loved them with all his heart. He loved his Oklahoma and Louisanna families completely. John's father was from Louisanna and his mother was from Oklahoma. Being that John was from Thailand, he called himself The Cajun Asian Okie. He was a unique and special person.



Festival Fundamentals

OKM Music Annual Festival and Bartlesville Community Center

Welcome to the 2021 OKM Festival. In the event of inclement weather for our June 11 or June 17 performances, those events will move indoors to the Bartlesville Community Center. As our guests, we ask that you respect the Bartlesville Community Center's courtesy points throughout the areas occupied by OKM Music.

- Before entering the Bartlesville Community Center, please dispose of all food and beverages.
- Before the start of the performance, please turn off your cell phones.
- Please be aware that use of tobacco products is not permitted in any part of our venue.
- Before concert announcements are made, the house lights in the auditorium will dim for a few seconds. Please refrain from talking while announcements are being made from the stage.
- As a matter of courtesy, latecomers will be seated only during an appropriate break in the music.
- Please note that for concerts held at the Bartlesville Community Center, a physical ticket is required. For performances held off-site, check in with OKM host/hostess.
- Wheelchair access and a listening system for hearing-impaired audience members are available. Please inform the box office at the time you place your ticket order if you have need of a particular accommodation.
- In the event of a power failure, emergency systems will restore lighting in 25 seconds. Please remain seated while the power is being restored. If an emergency requires immediate evacuation, you will be advised by an announcement. Trained ushers will assist in supervising evacuation procedures.
- The use of recording equipment is prohibited.
- Restrooms are located in the north and south lobbies near the entry areas, as well as at the back of the auditorium at the top of the south stairs.

Tulsa Performing Arts Center - June 13

- Patrons with physical disabilities are welcome at the Tulsa PAC. ADA-compliant entry doors are available at the entrances on 2nd Street and 3rd Street (canopies over the respective doors). Patrons attending events in Chapman Music Hall can use either 3rd Street lobby elevator on the west wall and go up one level using the button marked "O" for Orchestra.
- You may enter the Performing Arts Center two hours before the starting time of an event.
 If you arrive late and are held out, you can watch the performance from the PAC's TV monitors located on all three levels of Chapman Music Hall and in the Williams lobby.
- Please silence all cell phones and message systems before entering the theater. Please note that the opening and closing of cell phones and sending messages may disturb patrons and performers.
- Taking photos (with or without flash) and videos, or recording an event in any manner is prohibited. The taking of flash photographs may be dangerous for the performers. Recorders, cameras and cell phones with built-in cameras and other recording devices may be confiscated.
- Restrooms are located on the balcony, mezzanine and Third Street lobby floors for Chapman events, and immediately adjacent to the John H. Williams Theatre lobby for events in the other theaters. A large suite of restrooms is located on the Promenade level.
- To help ensure the safety of our audiences, masks are strongly recommended.
- If you are experiencing flu-like symptoms, including headache, fever, cough, difficulty breathing, sore throat, or loss or smell or taste,

In the event of inclement weather, the June 10, June 14 or June 17 performances will be moved indoors to the Bartlesville Community Center.

In Memoriam

OKM Music is remembering those involved heavily with and/or contributed to OKM that passed away over the last year. Their passion for community, music and the arts will be forever remembered.

Stephen Goforth 1959 - 2020

Trumpet performer for the Bartlesville Symphony and OK Mozart

Stephen Goforth, principal trumpet player for the Bartlesville Symphony Orchestra, was remembered as "a great teacher and a leader" after his death in an accident at his ranch near Chelsea.

Stephen loved music. He was an exemplary musician, receiving accolades of all kinds over many years. He was an expert trumpet player, a jack-of-all-trades in terms of style and ability. Stephen warmed many hearts with his brilliant, yet personal performances. He performed in thousands of programs ranging from solo recitals to nursing home dinners, including several showcase events and performances for OK Mozart over the years. He played with church orchestras, full big bands, symphonies, small and large ensembles, and everything in between. He collaborated with too many great musicians to list, the likes of Doc Severinsen, Arturo Sandoval, Bobby McFerrin, and many others.

He was most recently the principal trumpet player for both the Signature Symphony in Tulsa and the Bartlesville Community Orchestra. He was also a tremendous educator, teaching at Oklahoma Baptist University and Oklahoma City University, leading regular masterclasses and clinics for hundreds of programs and working with countless private students. Much of his greatest joy was in his broad studio of music students – he loved them dearly and considered teaching them a ministry. Stephen's musical heritage lives on in his many compositions, recordings, and in the music of countless colleagues that shared the beautiful craft with him.

James Stephen Conatser 1948

James Stephen Conatser, known to friends and family as Steve or "The Judge," passed away Thursday, December 24, at the age of 72 in Bartlesville, Oklahoma.


Growing up, you could find Steve spending his days playing golf and baseball, and investing many hours playing music on his drums. He was part of the Col High Marching Band as well as the drummer in bands with school friends called "The Echos" and "The Fungus". After earning his law degree, Steve returned to Bartlesville to start his law practice in 1975. While continuing in private practice, he was appointed to serve as the Municipal Judge for the City of Bartlesville in February 1981, a position he held until his death.

Steve was a devoted father and grandfather. Friends and family knew a man who was always patient and professional, kind, dignified, and always willing to help solve problems in the most calm, thoughtful way. Steve will be remembered for his love for the game of golf and for his years of playing drums in a local band, "Distant Thunder". He also had many other passions, including flying and bowling. He was a longtime member of the Oklahoma Bar Association, Washington County Bar Association, Bartlesville Rotary Club, and Hillcrest Country Club.




Grace (Betty) Herdman 1925 - 2020

Betty met Eric B. Herdman, Jr., who worked with the Bureau of Reclamation in Estes Park, CO. They married on June 30, 1951. Eric joined Phillips Petroleum Company and they moved to Borger, TX, where their two daughters were born. Additional moves took them to Amarillo and Arlington, TX; Bartlesville, OK; Aberdeen, SD; St. Louis, MO; Wheaton, IL; Greenville, MS; Raleigh, NC, and Pasadena, TX, before returning to Bartlesville in 1973.

Her husband died in 2001 and Betty relocated to Inverness Village, Tulsa, OK, in 2006, where she was involved in many activities, including bringing and driving many groups to the OK Mozart Festival each year. She was a Deacon and Elder in the Presbyterian Church (USA) and a member of the Sapulpa congregation. Betty is survived by her children, Jan, Linda, and David and their spouses, Rich, Jim, and Nancy; five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren; her brother, John of St. Louis; nieces, and a nephew.





Canadian Brass

With an international reputation as one of the most popular brass ensembles today, Canadian Brass has truly earned the distinction of "the world's most famous brass group.

Friends Chuck Daellenbach and Gene Watts first came together in 1970 to form a brass guintet — a chamber music setting not entirely new, but never before having garnered the success and storied career Canadian Brass would achieve over the next 40 years. Initially, Gene took on the role of developing new repertoire while Chuck was the moving force in marketing, publishing and managing the business. Three empty chairs were quickly filled and together, the group's imagination and consummate musicianship elevated the art of the brass quintet to what it is today. Here was not only an opportunity to explore the possibilities of an all-brass chamber group but a challenge to bring the sound and the excitement of brass music to new audiences.

Masters of concert presentations, Canadian Brass has developed a uniquely engaging stage presence and rapport with audiences. Each of their concerts will show the full range from trademark Baroque and Dixieland tunes to new compositions and arrangements created especially for them – from formal classical presentation to music served up with lively dialogue and theatrical effects. The hallmark of any Canadian Brass performance is entertainment, spontaneity, virtuosity and, most of all, fun – but never at the expense of the music: Whatever the style, the music is central and performed with utmost dedication, skill and excellence.

With a discography of over 130 albums and an extensive world-wide touring schedule, Canadian Brass is an important pioneer in bringing brass music to mass audiences everywhere. They have sold well over 2 million albums worldwide, with 1.2 million sold in the Nielsen Soundscan era alone (since 1991). They continue to score Billboard chart positions - like with their rousing recording of patriotic songs and marches, Stars & Stripes: Canadian Brass Salute America, which spent 8 weeks in the Top 25 on the Billboard Classical Chart, peaking at #2! Touring legends with an enthusiastic fan base, the Canadian Brass play to packed houses everywhere throughout the USA, Canada, Japan and Europe. They have also toured Australia, the Middle East, the Soviet Union and

South America. They were the first brass ensemble from the West to perform in the People's Republic of China (where they returned for a 5-city tour to great acclaim in the spring of 2010 and several visits after this, including an appearance on Hunan TV for Chinese New Year) as well as the first brass group to take the main stage at the venerable Carnegie Hall. On numerous occasions Canadian Brass has been invited by the Canadian Government to play for visiting heads of states, becoming one of Canada's greatest resources and musical ambassadors.

Millions of television viewers have had Canadian Brass in their homes with appearances on The Tonight Show, Today and Entertainment Tonight and recently to more than 1/2 a billion viewers for Chinese New Year on China's most popular station. They have appeared as quest artists on Evening at Pops with John Williams and the Boston Pops, Beverly Sills' Music Around the World, numerous PBS specials, including a celebrated appearance on Sesame Street, and are frequent guests of many major symphony orchestras. Canadian Brass were the featured artists on the soundtrack to the 1988 film The Couch Trip, starring Dan Aykroyd and Walter Matthau. Consummate artists, the quintet has also created unique and interactive videos that have gained an international audience including a series of DVDs featuring the brass in concert and teaching. They are on the cutting edge of technology offering their fans multimedia airplay, downloads and YouTube videos and streaming opportunities as well as digital applications with iPhone and other smartphone carriers. You can find them twittering and on Facebook with their fanbase growing daily!

The varied Canadian Brass repertoire features brass standards as well as a wide-ranging library of original arrangements. These include the works of Renaissance and Baroque masters, Classical works, marches, holiday favorites, ragtime, Dixieland, Latin, jazz, big band, Broadway and Christian music as well as popular songs and standards. Having started with a very limited base, Canadian Brass has created their own musical world by transcribing, arranging and commissioning more than 600 works, including critically acclaimed compositions from Michael Kamen, Luther Henderson, Bramwell Tovey, Don Gillis and more. They have transformed a previously neglected group of instruments with a limited repertoire into a versatile and vital ensemble that can play everything from Gabrieli to Gershwin! Canadian Brass is especially noted for their famous Holiday

Concerts at Christmas time and was at the forefront of re-establishing Scott Joplin with today's audiences through their research, arrangements and recordings of his "rags" and other works.

Education plays a key role in the story of Canadian Brass and each member is uniquely attuned to training the next generation of players. On their travels around the world, they often pause for masterclasses and are more than happy to work with students and young audiences. Canadian Brass is currently Ensemble in Residence at the University of Toronto after having been Chamber Quintet-in-Residence for many years at the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara, California, and has created an innovative brass summer course at the Eastman School of Music. Their support of education is also clearly viewed in their outreach and interaction with El Sistema, the acclaimed global music education program in Venezuela.

In conjunction with the Hal Leonard Corporation, the Canadian Brass have made available their extensive library of brass music for performers of all levels as well as learning tools. Since 1998 Canadian Brass has been a recording artist at Opening Day Entertainment Group (ODEG) (distributed by IDLA) releasing over 25 CDs on the imprint to date. Opening Day is owned and run by Chuck Daellenbach together with his wife, MB. Canadian Brass sheet music and recordings are available in their online store.

With four decades under their belts, Canadian Brass continues to thrill audiences around the world – and they don't look like they are letting up anytime soon!

Bartlesville Man Pays Homage to Black History on Horseback

One of Jack Settle's songs pays tribute and recognizes Bartlesville community member, JW Wolfman Black.

John H. Wooten III, better known as JW Wolfman Black, normally sets aside time every spring to head west and celebrate an often-overlooked part of the Old West.But this year, the coronavirus pandemic kept him closer to home and he missed the annual 278-mile horseback ride to Lawton for a gathering of the Lawton-Fort Sill chapter of Buffalo Soldiers of the American West.

The blind black man is a common sight in Bartlesville as he takes to the roads on his horse. Once a year, wearing gold gloves, black boots and hat and a blue uniform, he mounts his horse and makes the 10-day ride to Lawton while carrying a U.S. flag.

"It gives me the opportunity to show respect to black pioneers," he said. "A lot of people think I'm crazy. I do it for history and the black persons through history who have contributed so much through history."

Wooten said a lot of people don't know that Bass Reeves was the was the first black deputy U.S. marshal west of the Mississippi River and that some historians believe he was the inspiration for the Lone Ranger. Reeves has been credited with arresting more than 3,000 felons in his career. In 1866, six all-black cavalry and infantry regiments were created after Congress passed the Army Organization Act, according to history. com. Their main tasks were to help control the Native Americans of the Plains, capture cattle rustlers and

thieves and protect settlers, stagecoaches, wagon trains and railroad crews along the Western front. Black's annual trip to Lawton usually takes him south on U.S. 75 through Tulsa, continuing on the Turner Turnpike. On one trek, he was two miles past the Sapulpa exit when an Oklahoma Highway Patrol trooper pulled him over and told him he couldn't ride on horseback through the area. Black said now he takes side roads After a long day's ride, he camps by the side of the road with his horse.

"There's been no trouble so far thanks to the man

upstairs," he said.

Wooten has lived all his life in Bartlesville with the exception of about 15 years. An auto accident blinded him, and he now is self-employed. He makes money by playing in a rhythmand-blues band, cutting grass and

trees, working on cars and helping build homes.

He says he is still going to travel, despite COVID-19, even if it just means going camping.

"I do everything a blind man isn't supposed to do," he said.

Bush, have appeared on the CBS "Early Show," and their music has been used numerous times on the television show, "The Young & The Restless."

ANTHONY PLANT GUITARIST



Tina was a featured performer at the Cartier High Jewelry Gala in New York City, and has recorded on hundreds of albums, with artists such as John Legend, Ciara, 3 Doors Down, Jordan Smith, David Archuleta, and Big K.R.I.T.

Tina's musical education began at the age of 3, when she began her piano studies in Shanghai, China. After coming to America at the age of 5, she began violin lessons with her mother and later began studying the cello under the instruction of her father, Lu-Yan Guo at the age of 7. Tina continued her professional cello studies with Eleonore Schoenfeld at the University of Southern California's Thornton School of Music on full scholarship, and was also a Governor's Scholar for academic excellence.

Tina's Music Video for "Queen Bee" won Best Short Film/ Music Video at the Downtown Los Angeles Film Festival. Her songs "Queen Bee" and "Forbidden City" are also available for download to play for Rockband on Xbox 360 and PlayStation. Metal Hammer Magazine UK described Tina as "an international sensation" and she was also featured in Glamour Magazine Russia and Official Playstation Magazine. Tina was the 2014 Innovation Award Recipient from the Asian Heritage Awards, named "Instrumentalist of the Year" at the 2015 Los Angeles Music Awards, and won in the New Age Category at the 2016 Hollywood Music in Media Awards. She was nominated for Best New Age Album at the 2017 Grammy Awards, and Female Artist of the Year at the 2018 Classic BRIT Awards.

In 2015, she released a Charity album with 13 film/tv/media composers: "Tina Guo & Composers for Charity." 100% of the proceeds from the album go directly to Mr. Holland's Opus Foundation in support of music education.





Since 2014, she has joined Philip Glass in his ongoing world tour of his complete Piano Etudes.

Jenny's extensive discography includes critically acclaimed recordings on Steinway & Sons, hänssler CLASSIC, eOne Records, BIS Records, Albany Records, and Sunrise Records. Since 2000, she has over thirty albums to her credit. The New York Times called her disc of Federico Mompou's Musica Callada "...beautifully recorded...". ClassicsToday praised her 24 Preludes and Fugues Op. 87 by Dmitri Shostakovitch "...hands down the finest version of this massive work" and was voted Best of 2009 by the Washington Post, All-Music Guide raved: "The 11th Finger is a thrill ride for musical adventurers" and "Lin's playing is nothing less than superhuman", and Gramophone reported on her CD of Stravinsky's solo piano music "superbly recorded... another notable achievement from this gifted and imaginative artist." A passionate advocate for education, Jenny created "Melody's Mostly Musical Day", a musical picture book for children following the adventures of an imaginative little girl from breakfast to bedtime, told in a collection of 26 classical piano works from Mozart to Gershwin. A multimedia concert version has since been developed for her tours at schools and educational institutions throughout the USA and Canada.

Born in Taiwan and raised in Austria, Jenny studied with Noel Flores at the Hochschule für Musik in Vienna, with Julian Martin at the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore, and with Dominique Weber in Geneva. She has also worked with Leon Fleisher, Richard Goode, and Blanca Uribe, and with Dimitri Bashkirov and Andreas Staier at the Fondazione Internazionale per il pianoforte in Como, Italy. She holds a bachelor's degree in German Literature from The Johns Hopkins University and currently resides in New York City.



Grady Nichols - Performing at 6:00 p.m.

Throughout a career spanning over two decades, Nichols has crafted seven highly acclaimed albums and performed extensively, opening for such luminaries as Luciano Pavarotti, Ray Charles, Al Green, Wayman Tisdale and The Beach Boys. A riveting live act, his repertoire runs the gamut from his own original songs to pop/rock classics and Motown hits. His songwriting and musicianship have earned him the respect of his peers, and his albums have featured such acclaimed guest vocalists as Chicago's Bill Champlin, Leigh Nash of Sixpence None the Richer, Andy Chrisman of 4Him and awardwinning songwriter Zac Maloy.

"Tony Bennett once told me that what he tries to do as a jazz vocalist is sound like an instrumentalist and I thought, 'Wow, I'm going to do the opposite of that," Nichols says of his approach to his artistry. "I'm going to sound like a vocalist.

Obviously, as a horn player, you've got to have chops, practice technique and study the greats, but I also spent a lot of time picking vocalists that I liked and analyzing

their phrasing and how they approach a lyric, and then I tried to approximate it as much as I could with how I would play that lyric. I try to communicate an emotion and state the melody as such that it sounds like somebody is singing it."

That creative philosophy combined with his natural musical gift has made Nichols one of the most respected musicians in the country. A 2016 recipient of the Golden Hope Award, Nichols has also received the Legacy Tribute Award from the Oklahoma Jazz Hall of Fame and the Outstanding Achievement in Jazz honor from the prestigious Charlie Christian Music Festival. It's all been much more than Nichols ever expected to come from his childhood obsession with the sax.

A chance meeting with Sanborn during his college years cemented Nichols desire to become a professional sax player. "What I loved about Sanborn was he talked a lot about having your own sound," he recalls. "We had a great conversation. It wasn't like a musician to fan discussion. It was player to player and he was just very encouraging. At the time I was like 19 or 20, and that really made a huge impression on me musically. It set me on a course of discovery. 'What's my voice? There already is a David Sanborn or a Kenny G,' so I really worked on trying to find my own sound, my own voice so that if you heard a few notes, you would know it was me."

Nichols succeeded in establishing his own unique sound. In 1996, he recorded his first album, Between You and Me. "I did four studio cuts and the rest was from a live performance because there really is nothing that could replace what playing in front of a live audience does to you, the energy and how much fun it is," he enthuses. "Playing live versus recording in a studio is just two different mentalities. Right after I released the first album, Tulsa got a jazz station and at the time they were very hungry for people who did this kind of music. I had just put out this record, so they started playing me. I got management and then we started expanding where we got played and did another record and it did pretty well on radio, also."

Nichols' career continued to gain momentum. He's played the most prestigious venues in the country and in the studio, he has worked with such noted producers as Chris Rodriguez, Jeff Lorber, Michael Omartian, Zac Maloy and David Hamilton. He's made frequent forays onto Billboard's Jazz chart with entries like "London Baby!" riding the chart for six months, and his Christmas collection, Falling in Love with Christmas, peaking at No. 2 on the smooth Jazz.com holiday charts.

Baha Men - Performing at 7:30 p.m.

Bill Doenges Memorial Stadium

Approaching their 30th anniversary as a group, the Baha Men rode a massive wave of success in the early 2000s following the release of hit single, 'Who Let the Dogs Out'. Featured in major motion pictures and chanted throughout sports stadiums around the globe, the Baha Men unleashed a revolutionary form of Caribbean pop that permeated American pop culture.

The hit single would go on to earn the band several awards including a 2000 Grammy Award for Best Dance Recording, as well as Billboard Music Awards for World Music Artist and Album of the Year. The group would also win a Nickelodeon Kids Choice Award for Favorite Song the same year, then follow it up with another Kids Choice Award for Favorite Band in 2002.

Their worldwide success also propelled them into the film industry, where they saw several of their songs featured in movies such as Miss Congeniality, Around the World in 80 Days, Garfield: The Movie, Men In Black II, and most notably, The Hangover. 2003 also saw their hit song 'Best Years of Our Lives' featured in the international hit, Shrek.

A relationship with Disney brought about several opportunities for the Baha Men, as well. In 2002, the group covered *The Lion King* classic, 'Hakuna Matata', for the debut DisneyMania album. The band would also go on to record 'Bahama Roller

Coaster Ride', their take on 'Hawaiian Roller Coaster Ride' from the movie Lilo & Stitch for DisneyMania 4. Recognized by Rolling Stone as "Bahamian junkanoo pioneers", the Baha Men continue to hit monumental milestones. With the support of Sony Music Entertainment, the group released 'Night and Day' in 2014. Soon after, the track was selected to be featured alongside Shakira, Jennifer Lopez, Santana, and others in the 2014 FIFA World Cup Official Album, In 2015. the band released Ride With Me, their first album in over ten years, following a performance at the halftime show of a New York Giants vs. Dallas Cowboys game. The album would mark the beginning of a relationship between the Baha Men and producer Troyton Rami (Sean Paul, Beenie Man, Wayne Wonder), who would go on to produce future releases. As the band nears 100 million cumulative streams worldwide, the group has also performed on Live with Kelly and Ryan, The Bachelorette, and collaborated with Our Last Night for a performance that has since surpassed a million views on YouTube.

Through a partnership with producer Troyton Rami, the Baha Men first released 'Bumpa' on February 22nd, 2018. Reaching 200K Spotify streams since release and featured on Sirius XM's Venus Channel, they followed up the single with the April 5th, 2019 release of 'Let's Go'. Produced by DJ Buddha (Pitbull), the band honed their high-energy, junkanoo-meets-hip hop brew.



A Female Overture of Accomplishments

Kassia, Francesca Caccini, Fanny Mendelsson Hensel, Clara Schumann

For two thousand years, Female composers have demonstrated a passion for composition evidenced by an intellectual, spiritual, and creative expression of music. Yet, the social constraints that have transcended over time have made it very difficult if not impossible for females to write and publish music under their own names. Cultural and religious beliefs, fear of competition, and societal dispersions have consistently prevented female composers from achieving notoriety. However, today we recognize the amazing musical accomplishments and stories of these remarkable women who let their passion for music prevail over societal expectations.

Kassia (810-865 AD)

Kassia was a Byzantine abbess and composer. She is one of the earliest female composers to have her music survive to present day. Kassia was born to a wealthy family and was thought of as very intellectual, beautiful, and had social standing. Her traits were very desirable which resulted in Emperor Theophilus interviewing her for marriage. Theophilus humiliated by Kassia's wit, rejected her as his bride. Kassia was devastated and ashamed to have desired Theophilus and shortly thereafter decided to enter a convent where she composed at least 23 hymns. Convents were instrumental incubators for female composers. Kassia's hymn to Mary Magdalene, written in mid-800's, is still sung today in Greek Orthodox Churches. Kassia is known for her groundbreaking use of musical motifs.



Francesca Caccini (1587-1640)

In 1604, King Henry IV of France declared Francesca Caccini the best singer in all of his kingdom. She was a student of Latin, poetry, geometry, astrology, philosophy, language, and music. As a young adult (age 19), she was asked to write music for the Carnival that year. Her work was a triumph and a breakthrough for her long musical career. She soon was made the "La Musica" to the Grand Duke of Tuscany. She was a beautiful singer, talented musician and accomplished composer. She could produce music in days or weeks; whereas, most composers take nine months to years to complete pieces. Caccini was the first female composer to write an Opera. Caccini was blessed with two marriages during her life; however, both husbands preceded her in death and both left amazingly kind wills bequeathing all property to Caccini. She bore both a son and a daughter during her two marriages. Ultimately, Caccini entered a convent where it became a critical place for creativity and further compositions.

Fanny Mendelssohn Hensel (1805-1847)

Fanny Mendelssohn and her brother Felix Mendelssohn were child prodigies, gifted composers and wonderful pianists. Fanny was encouraged very early on by her Father to play piano and compose. However, while he encouraged Felix to pursue a career in music; he forbid Fanny to play in public or work as a performer. Fanny was prohibited from performing in public so Felix would often perform her compositions. Unfortunately, this often left the audience and public at large believing Felix rather than Fanny wrote the compositions. At age 40, Fanny finally decided she would publish her compositions under her own name. Fanny and her brother were very close growing up. Fanny Mendelssohn composed very deep and high-quality music.





Clara Wieck Schumann (1587-1640)

Clara Schumann was a child prodigy and brilliant adult musician whose career spanned 60 plus years. She received a remarkable musical education. She spent all day every day studying theory and composition, starting on her 5th birthday. Clara Schumann transformed the manner in which pianists performed by playing entire recitals by memory. Clara was forced to sacrifice her career due to taking care of her eight children and supporting her husband. Clara often wrote in her diary that as society believed women should not compose, she found it difficult to believe she had creative talent. She composed 66 pieces for solo piano as well as 4 pieces for orchestra and 29 songs. Ironically, she played a major role in getting the works of her husband recognized. She had a long and productive career.

Female composers have boldly, quietly, gently, and passionately written artfully mastered compositions throughout time. The contribution made by these gifted and extraordinary musicians are truly inspirational and worthy of acknowledgement. It is important to promote female composers and embrace their contributions to the arts. Still today, less than 1.8 % of all recognized composers are women.

2021 Commemorative Artist Ragon Steele

An important part of planning is the festival artist and the art piece chosen to represent the event. This year, local artist Ragon Steele was chosen by the staff and board to be its commemorative artist again.

Ragon Steele's artwork was chosen in 2019 for OKM's 35th anniversary festival. Last year, the staff of OKM had asked Steele to paint a commemorative painting of the Frank Phillips Home, as its original plans were to house a performance on the lawn. His work has been so well-received by its patrons and guests that the OKM staff wanted to continue working with this talented artist again.

For OKM's 2021 festival, the finale performance will feature Tulsa jazz saxophonist Grady Nichols, as well as the Grammy award-winning group Baha Men at the Bill Doenges Memorial Stadium in downtown Bartlesville. The stadium was chosen to be the focal point of the artwork this year as OKM has been showcasing various Bartlesville landmarks over the last few years. Within a timespan of five weeks, Steele had painted an original depiction of the Bill Doenges Memorial

Stadium for the festival to use on note cards, invitations, T-shirts, and more.

Although well-known in the Bartlesville community, Steele recently answered some questions that might provide additional insight to his character:

What inspired you to be an artist?

"I have always liked art and took it all through high school, although, I was not very good. Most of my art looked like a Picasso or a Van Gogh, however, that was not always my goal. When taking art courses at Missouri State, I asked my wrestling coach what I should major in, his response was to 'major in something that doesn't require nightly grading papers if you want to coach."

What do you enjoy painting the most and why?

"I enjoy painting things that mean something to me or those around me. Bartlesville landscapes capture feelings and emotional value to many people. I also enjoy doing portraits. After the September 11th crash at the World Trade Center, I was commissioned to do a portrait of a girl that was on one of those planes."

Were there any challenges painting the 2021 OKM commemorative painting?

"This painting had presented some unique challenges. First, this angle of the stadium had to be taken from quite high off the ground. My brother and I went to the stadium on two consecutive evenings to try to capture the angle that OKM wanted with the Bartlesville skyline in the background. The original drawing took me six days working about two hours each night. The hardest part was getting the sky the way OKM had wanted, matching their color scheme for the festival this year. Altogether, the painting took five weeks to complete."

Zitkála-Śá was a Yankton Sioux who lived in South Dakota as a child in the late 1800's. She was given her name because it meant Red Bird. Zitkala was filled with a passion for music and became a famous Native American author, musician, and activist.

As a child, Zitkála found herself caught between two worlds – White and Native American. She left home when she was only eight years old to go to a boarding school in Indiana. She was given the name Gertrude Simmons while at school. She missed her Mother, her friends, and her way of life. Zitkála-Śá found harmony and joy in her music classes. She once said that, "My wounded spirit soared like a bird as I practiced the violin and piano." After graduation, Zitkála-Śá became a music teacher, composer, activist, ambassador for her people, and performer.

She loved singing, writing stories and giving speeches about her people, the Yankton Sioux. In her adult years, Zitkála-Śá worked hard as an activist for Native American rights, hoping to bridge the two cultures of the White and Native American world.

Zitkála-Śá wrote many famous stories: "American Indian Stories", "Old Indian Legends", and "Oklahoma's Poor Rich Indians." She also collaborated with William F. Hanson to write "The Sun Dance Opera." It was the first American Indian Opera written. However, in 1938, when the opera premiered

at the Broadway Theatre, the only public credit was given to William F. Hanson.

Zitkála-Śá died in 1938 at the age of 61. Her legacy lives on as one of the most influential Native American authors and activists. The preservation of her people's culture, including music and the arts, was a passion that is felt in her music, art work, and stories

TRUE CRIME INVESTIGATOR.

In addition to her love of music and poetry, Zitkála-Śá co-wrote a 42 page document in 1924 that revealed the ongoing crimes of murder, legal corruption, and exploitation in Osage County. Zitkala-Sa revealed the greed that pervaded the court system involving white male attorneys, judges and court appointed guardians. The amount of wealth and lives stolen from the Osage Native Americans is horrific. "Oklahoma's Poor Rich Indians: An Orgy of Graft and Exploitation of the Five Civilized Tribes-Legalized Robbery" is an unbelievable first-hand account of an unimaginable time in American history written from a first-hand account of what Zitkála-Śá watched in the Courtroom and the stories she learned from those who survived.

Music Education

The mission of OKM Music is to deliver high quality music and cultural experiences for all ages. OKM Music promotes Oklahoma artists at all levels from early-childhood to adults through enriching music education. At its core, OKM fosters the collaborative and creative spirit of musicians and artists of all genres in an effort to make the arts accessible to all.

At OKM Music, we hope to bridge the music gap and engage children in the arts while increasing awareness of the importance of arts education. OKM Music is dedicated to the arts for our public schools, private schools and home-schooled students.

OKM Music will periodically arrange group Masterclasses with professional artists for students in our community as well as bring opportunities for younger children in Ambler Hall to tactile learning through exposure to various orchestra instruments donated and funded by OKM Music.

Our Masterclass offerings allow students aged 12-18 to meet professional musicians, learning technique and craft in a traditional apprenticeship manner, at no cost to the students. In addition, OKM Music is launching initiatives to bring children ages 4-11 an educational experience interacting with musicians and instruments.

Our goal, like the Masterclass offerings, is to get youth out of the audience and in direct contact with musicians. We also partner with local schools and youth organizations to bring guest artists in for mini concerts and educational Q&A sessions. In addition, OKM collaborates with the Bartlesville Salvation Army for a summer conservatory.

In 2018, OKM introduced its scholarship program. We offer two \$1,000 merit-based scholarships to local students. This opportunity allows OKM Music to give back to the community that has supported it for over 36 years. We are helping shape the future of the music and arts programs in our community by supporting local students aspiring to careers in music and in the arts.

Oktoberfest

Every year, traditional food flavors, culture and entertainment is brought to Bartlesville during OKM's annual Oktoberfest. The German-American Society of Tulsa's Blaskapelle and Mach Schnell liven up the party with polka music, while GAST's folk dancers demonstrate authentic German dancing.

In 2020, rather than cancelling the popular festival, OKM hosted its annual Oktoberfest virtually. Guests purchased delicious German meals from Price's Meat Market and CAKES by Lissa had yummy treats and more to take home. The Polka Brothers in New York City performed an exciting polka-themed concert for virtual guests.

The 2021 Oktoberfest is scheduled for October 2.

Christkindl Market

In 2020, OKM hosted its fourth Christkindl Market virtually. Attendees got the opportunity to shop online through many pages of unique Holiday trinkets and gifts, send "ugly Christmas Sweater" grams to friends, as well as purchase delicious Holiday meals, tamales, and treats from Price's Meat Market, CAKES by Lissa, and Super Centro. History of OKM Music



The OKM Music Festival was originally called the OK Mozart International Festival when it began in 1983, after Nan Buhlinger, Bartlesville musician, arts administrator and community leader, met Ransom Wilson. The Solisti New York Orchestra, led by Wilson, was performing at the Bartlesville Community Center as part of a U.S. tour.

Wilson and Buhlinger thought this would be a great place for a music festival, given the exemplary acoustics at the BCC. After a lot of hard work, their idea came to fruition and the first festival kicked off during a weekend in June 1985. Wilson served as artistic director and Buhlinger was executive director of the music festival. It soon expanded to a 10-day festival, featuring many of the world's finest performers in classical music, among them Joshua Bell, Sarah Chang, James Galway, Itzhak Perlman and Leontyne Price.





Showcase and children's events added cultural and local flavor to the festival for out-of-town guests. Those events continue today.

Solisti served as the orchestra in residence through 2005, until Wilson resigned as artistic director. Because he owned the rights to the Solisti New York name, the musicians continued on at OK Mozart under a new name, Amici New York. By 2016, however, the festival turned a new direction and put the "OK" back into OK Mozart by utilizing the state's own prominent orchestras.

The Bartlesville event held each June was named for the Austrian classical composer Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. During the years, programs

expanded to include everything from classical and contemporary music to bluegrass, gospel and popular music. As the festival continued to evolve and bring on more variety in music genres, the time was ripe for a name change. In 2017, the OK Mozart Music Festival became known as OKM Music, still retaining its early heritage with OKM, but going a step further to include all music.


